Many schools of nursing have no formal training for clinical nurse faculty or preceptors, especially in rural areas. Even more do not train clinical nurse faculty to be mentors, leaders, or educators with undergraduate students in the hospital setting. This formalized training program helps support preceptors to be better prepared to provide feedback, lead, and foster professionalism in future generations of nurses.

PROGRAM GOAL

To increase in the skilled, gualified clinical nursing faculty and preceptors throughout the six states of Montana, Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, and Wyoming.

MORH/AHEC, the Colorado Center for Nursing Excellence (CNE), and Schools of Nursing at the University of Colorado, Montana State University, North Dakota State University, South Dakota State University, Southern Utah University, and the Wyoming Center for Nursing have partnered to create a Clinical Nursing Faculty & Preceptor Academy (CFPA) for the Rocky Mountain region. This program provides three training programs to strengthen and support our clinical nursing faculty and preceptors working in rural and frontier parts of the mountain west.

- 2. Clinical Scholar
- 3. Montana AHEC Preceptor Course

This program is funded through HRSA's Nurse Education, Practice, Quality and Retention Clinical Faculty and Preceptor Academies (NEPQR-CFPA).


